2024 HIGHLIGHTS & ACHIEVEMENTS

In 2024, EastWest Food Rescue achieved remarkable milestones, serving thousands of individuals in need. Our community-driven initiatives resulted in significant food recovery and distribution. Volunteers dedicated countless hours, showcasing their commitment and passion. Through partnerships with local businesses, we expanded our reach and strengthened our impact. The collective efforts of our team and supporters contributed to a healthier, more sustainable community.

Farm Support & Partnership Expansion

In 2024, we took significant strides in strengthening our relationships with local farms by hiring a Program Manager dedicated to enhancing outreach to small and mid-sized farms and low-barrier food access partners in Washington. Our continued efforts in targeted food purchasing through WSDA-funded programs have played a crucial role in alleviating financial stress for local farms while providing fresh produce to food-insecure households.

Food Distribution & Equity

This year, we successfully distributed over **5.2 million pounds** of food to food-insecure communities across more than 20 counties. Our commitment to equity-first distribution has been bolstered by partnerships with low-barrier access and culturally aligned organizations, specifically those in rural communities throughout the state.

Preventing Waste & Protecting the Planet

Our initiatives in food rescue have significantly contributed to reducing farm-level waste, aligning with **Washington's goal of a 50%** reduction by 2030. Enhancements in last-mile delivery infrastructure and cross-docking have improved our operational efficiency while lowering emissions. We've also started tracking environmental impact data, including metrics on food diverted and greenhouse gas savings, underscoring our commitment to sustainability.

Internal Capacity & Strategic Readiness

To boost transparency and impact evaluation, we are transitioning from Google Suite to an ERP platform. We've developed core processes for purchasing, distribution, logistics, and data collection. Our increased visibility in hunger relief and sustainability policy positions us for proactive legislative engagement in 2025, ensuring we continue to drive meaningful change in these critical areas.

We are so appreciative of East West Food Rescue's commitment to work with us. It was through their network that we were able to get thousands of pounds of premium fruit into the hands of so many in need.


Financials


