LEADERSHIP LETTER

To Our Supporters,

EastWest Food Rescue started as a grassroots effort in May 2020 during the COVID-19 pandemic to decrease food waste and address hunger in Washington state. EWFR's strategy is to acquire surplus from farmers, organize transportation, and ensure rescued food is given to people with food insecurity for free.

In our first annual report, you can learn about what we achieved with a volunteer-led organization in only 8 months—we **saved or acquired more than 35 million pounds (28 million meals)** of predominantly fresh food and **distributed it to over 700 community food relief organizations** with the help of our partners:

The pandemic is waning, thankfully. However, even with many Americans going back to work, food security remains an issue, and farmers still have surplus, nutritious food that can be leveraged to address community needs. In Washington, 2021 research data indicates that 27% of households are food insecure, and 33% of households with children remain food insecure (https://nutr.uw.edu/cphn/wafood/brief-8).

Those in need include working families and people ineligible for government food benefits. Traditional food banks play a key role in supporting food needs; however, many people who are food insecure cannot or do not regularly access food via traditional food banks. Based on our research, non-traditional food agencies and food drives can provide an easier means to access sufficient quantities of free, fresh, nutritious food without requiring a significant time away from work or family commitments. Today, there is a clear need to address the both the hunger and nutrition gap as well as the service gap through working with a broad range of food agencies.

Our 2021 plan includes a focus on:

Purchasing crops to support farmers and bringing free food to community food agency organizations;
Expanding our logistics so that we can bring more food to smaller food agency groups;
Building grassroots farmer agreements including growing and gleaning contracts; and
Expanding distribution within Washington State.

EWFR has low overhead and is nimble; we work to access surplus food to take advantage of very short notice opportunities and distribute fresh food quickly without needing to store it. Our low per-pound food acquisition cost (currently at less than .10/pound) extends our ability to leverage donations.

We remain committed to fulfilling our mission, **supporting our farmers and caringly feeding our neighbors in need.** Thank you for your generosity and commitment to EastWest Food Rescue. moving commitment of our partners and community.






Financials
